This year in our monthly articles we are considering favorite verses from the Bible.

"Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see." Hebrews 11:1

It is amazing that with only a few clicks on a computer, we can dramatically alter photos. Such capabilities have led us to be a bit more wary. We find ourselves saying, "Unless I see it with my own eyes, how can I believe that it hasn't been touched up? I'll believe it when I see it."

Often this cynical attitude can touch our spiritual life. How can I believe that God loves me and knows what is going on in my life considering all troubles and disappointments I have to deal with?

The Bible tells us, "Now faith is being sure of what

we hope for and certain of what we do not see." How can we be sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see?

Think of a father and child playing the game where the father stands behind the child and tells him to fall backwards. The child, unable to see his father, still trusts that he is there and is certain that his father won't let him hit the ground. The child leans back and falls, fully convinced that his father will keep his word and

catch him, because his father has always proved trustworthy.

This is the kind of trust we can have in our heavenly Father. Though we did not see the creation or the crucifixion, though we were not present to witness Jesus rising from the Easter tomb, though we have not heard his actual voice forgiving our sins and promising his return, we believe.

Worship and the Mask Mandate

Loved ones of Zion,

"I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree with one another in what you say and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly united in mind and thought." (1 Corinthians 1:10, NIV) We are people united in Jesus Christ. While we each have different experiences and backgrounds that lead to different opinions and political leanings, we are not to lose sight of the eternal things that unite us in Jesus: Our faith, our salvation, our mission to spread the good news of Jesus. As we face the ongoing health crisis in our country, many people are allowing and even promoting division. Let us not allow that in our church. We stay united by keeping our focus on the goal Jesus has given us: to communicate the gospel. No matter what your opinion about the decisions we make about precautions to take in public worship, please remember that they are not made to take a political stance or further divide us, but to communicate the gospel in the best way we know how, given the circumstances.

Because of the current mandate given by the governor of Wisconsin, we are requiring masks of all people who gather in our church building for worship.

Our reasoning for our change in practice follows:

- 1) In faith, a Christian needs to follow God's 3rd
 Commandment "Remember the Sabbath Day by keeping it holy" and worship God.¹ While it would be easy to say, "It's not worth the hassle" we need to hear God's Word for the strength of our faith. Your fellow believers need you to worship with them for their encouragement in that same faith.
- 2) In faith, a Christian needs to obey God's 4th
 Commandment, "Honor your father and mother", and
 obey authorities under which God has placed us. 2 The
 governing authorities, whom God has instituted have
 mandated this practice. There is some debate about
 whether or not we have to follow a "mandate" when
 this is not a law. There is some thought that if the
 authorities are not going to enforce something we
 don't have to follow it. However, God requres us us to
 obey earthly authorities according to the spirit of the
 law, not just the letter.

3) In faith, a Christian needs to obey the 5th Commandment and will protect his neighbor's safety and well-being. Freedom in Christ means that we, in love, gladly make the choice to do what is best for the safety and assurance of our neighbor. Romans 14:1-33 directs us to assume that our fellow Christians make their choices out of faith in Jesus, without passing judgment unless something is blatantly sinful. However, Romans 13:84 directs us to use our freedom to make choices in the best interest of our neighbors over our personal preferences. Wearing a mask in a public place, at the very least, assures people that you are looking out for their best interest.

According to studies (albeit studies that have not been fully reviewed or timetested) mask-wearing protects people from potentially harmful droplets that spread disease.



For some, the necessity of wearing masks will lead to a decision that many have already made about worshiping in public: they will not. We respect that decision and so will continue to offer weekly online services. New online services are posted each Sunday at 8:00 AM and changed out on our local cable station every Tuesday by 3 PM. We will also renew our encouragement to make an appointment with our pastors to receive private communion if you are not going to worship with us in our scheduled services.

It's a scramble to keep up with constantly changing circumstances. We appreciate your understanding that we are changing our practices in a way that best continues to communicate God's life-saving, unchanging gospel to each other and the world around us.



WELS Center for Mission and Ministry deals with COVID-19

ongregations throughout the synod have been making many adjustments to their worship and ministry ever since the COVID-19 pandemic began. Even though many of us expected things to have returned to normal by now, that is not the case. Government mandates and advisories continue to have a varying impact on WELS congregations and schools. But, true to their mission, they continue to proclaim the saving gospel, and God's people continue to worship in spite of the obstacles.

Similar challenges have affected the work of the synod. In synodical and district activities, as well at the WELS Center for Mission and Ministry (CMM), our synod's headquarters in Waukesha, changes have had to be made.

Throughout the synod, all large gatherings, including district conventions, were cancelled this summer. In-person meetings were replaced with virtual online meetings whenever possible. The workers at the CMM were initially given the option of working at home if the nature of their work permitted it. When the lockdown was declared, all employees were required to work remotely. When the lockdown ended, employees returned to the office in two phases, first with 50 percent returning and then two weeks later with all back to in-person work.

Now things have changed again. Here in Wisconsin, the governor recently issued a statewide mask mandate. Workers at the CMM are complying with this mandate, wearing masks in all public areas. We continue the policy of no meetings or gatherings in the building; individual visitors are allowed in the CMM only by personal appointment.

The policies governing meetings and other activities at the CMM are under constant review, with the next re-evaluation scheduled for Aug. 12. At that time, we will be determining whether meetings scheduled for this fall at the CMM can take place. We pray for a time when things can return completely to normal—for our synod and for our entire country. In the meantime, we continue to place our trust in God's protecting and gracious care.

New school year brings difficult decisions

were faced with the difficult job this summer of determining what school is going to look like in the fall, after the 2019–20 school year ended with online classes because of shutdowns due to the pandemic.

With 436 WELS schools serving over 42,000 students in 33 states—some with minimal numbers of COVID-19 cases and some considered "hot spots"—plans will differ across the country. But one thing is sure: "Sept. 1, 2020, is going to look different than Sept. 1, 2019, in every single one of our schools," says Mr. James Rademan, director of the Commission on Lutheran Schools (CLS).

While each plan will look different—with schools talking about in-person vs. virtua learning (or a combination of the two), face coverings, size of classes, social distancing, extracurriculars, disinfecting stations, and additional cleaning—Rademan says that the mindset he has seen from WELS schools as they determine how to proceed is remarkably similar: "Each one of the schools is really concerned about the safety of their students and their staff while trying to balance what is going to be best overall for the development of the children."

For both ALA and KML, the majority of the parents supported in-person classes

"Christian education is way more than just teaching in the classrooms," says Mr. Jamie Luehring, principal at Kettle Moraine. "It's the interactions the teachers have with the students, the mentorships, the

friendships, the support. You cannot do that as well virtually no matter how hard you try."

That decision to start with in-person dasses was not made in a vacuum. "We believe parents need to be in the driver's seat," says Luehring. "We want to work with them to come up with the best solutions for their kids."

Relief work from storms in lowa continues

Cleanup is continuing in Cedar Rapids, lowa, from storms that blew through the Midwest on Monday, Aug. 10.

The line of storms, called a derecho, had sustained winds of more than 100 miles per hour and damaged homes, downed trees, and left hundreds of thousands in lowa without power. Good Shepherd, the WELS church in Cedar Rapids, sustained major roof damage and felled trees; most of its members also had extensive cleanup to do on their properties.

WELS Christian Aid and Relief and Good Shepherd quickly organized a work weekend and recruited volunteers to clean up the church property as well as the yards of members and their neighbors and friends. More than 50 people, including members of Good Shepherd and WELS members who traveled to the area, gathered last weekend to help.

"The devastation is immense; it's hard to believe," says Rev. Dan Sims, director of WELS Christian Aid and Relief, who also volunteered at the work weekend. "There are massive trees down everywhere—lying on houses, on cars, on sheds, on driveways."

Volunteers went out in groups to clear trees and pick up debris. "I was working alongside of members of Good Shepherd who hadn't touched their own yards yet," says Sims.

"They had trees down too, but they were out helping other people. It was heartwarming to see."

He continues, "When you are servants of Jesus going out and helping those in need—it really makes an impression on people."
